Active AND Successful

- Directors attend meetings
- Members attend meetings
- Quality of life continually improves
- Property values are maintained or increase
- Association/Board NOT viewed as "Control Freaks"

Active AND Successful

- How do we achieve this?
 - Chicken or the egg dilemma
 - Is there a strong Board in place?
 - Are there vocal and active residents?
- Start with what you have
 - Don't force it
 - Pick the easiest path
 - Use external resources as required

Creating an Active Board

- Identify the existing forces
 - Interested in the overall community
 - Involved for one purpose only
 - Involved for "something to do"
 - Ego trips
- Identify potential players in the neighborhood
 - People attending meetings
 - Volunteers for projects/improvements
 - Vocal members regardless of issues raised

Creating an Active Board

Recruit Interested members

- Regardless of their agenda
- Spread the wealth around large neighborhoods
- Get as many members involved as possible

Develop positive alliances

- Bring current and potential Board members together who have common goals
- Understand all issues and goals of your alliances

Develop an agenda

- Include all goals....nothing is too big or small
- Prioritize list with total agreement
- Continually update the list

Creating an Active Board

- Decide on roles for balanced representation
 - Ascension to the throne
 - Can you easily rotate top officers?
 - If not, how do you achieve this?
 - How long to take control of Board
 - Choose next President wisely to keep continuity
 - Line up Vice President and future officers
 - Do you need an outside influence
 - Non-Board member pushing agenda
 - Do you need someone to "keep the Board honest"?

The Controlling Board

- What do you do with this scenario?
 - A small clique of dedicated members
 - Have definite ideas and goals
 - Do not listen to the membership
 - Interpret Covenants too tight or too loose

Start from the other end...with the membership

Creating an Active Membership

- Find residents with common concerns
 - Encourage them to attend meetings regularly to achieve their goals
 - If the Board is not listening, spread the word
 - Get more people involved
 - Ask on the record to have your issues listed as new business at the next meeting
 - Bring your immediate neighbors along
- If you do not already have neighborhood picnics, Easter egg hunts, etc., ask for these events (or demand them, after all if it's a mandatory Association, it's your money)

Creating an Active Membership

- Canvas the neighborhood and talk about concerns with any and everyone
 - Let people know you are adding their goals to your list
 - Encourage them to join you as you pursue the goals
- Identify those that are passionate about achieving the goals
 - Encourage, recruit, or draft them into leadership roles
 - Work towards getting those people a seat on the Board

Creating an Active Membership

- Strive towards placing non-Board members on architecture and welcoming committees, etc.
- Use the same techniques to get people appointed as representatives to the Edmond Neighborhood Alliance and other community based programs, committees and events
- Have a game plan to get to "Creating an Active Board" (see slides 2-6)

- What do you do when......
 - You have a strong and energetic Board, but no one comes to meetings (regular or annual)
 - High incidence of failure to pay dues
 - No one seems to care about the positive things happening in the neighborhood

- Find a rallying point for the membership...... Positive or Negative!
 - Positive and repetitive things and events generate interest
 - Picnics, parties, dedication ceremonies, etc.
 - Repetition keeps the positive in front of the membership
 - Use perceived negatives to create the positive
 - Notify all residents of negative impacts on the neighborhood by the City or surrounding developments
 - If the Association is non-mandatory, start an initiative to make it mandatory
 - In other words, sometimes a little controversy can be a good thing

Positives

- Easter egg hunts, picnics, fund raisers
 - Send out multiple notices and post signs at the entrances
 - Get as many people involved in the planning and execution as possible
- Notices, newsletters, etc. about improvements to the neighborhood
- Victories with the City, surrounding neighborhoods, or even negligent homeowners

Negatives

- Start sending out violation letters
- Carry through on enforcement of Covenants
- Don't be afraid to use the City Ordinances to help you with violations!!!
- Collect past due accounts through Small Claims Court
- Be prepared for the results!

- Do NOT run from the controversy!
- Make sure the Board is complying with the By-laws and/or Covenants
 - Have an approved budget in place
 - Have an annual audit of the books conducted and published
 - If non-mandatory Association, make sure you have By-laws in place to regulate what your Association can and cannot do!!!

- Openly and honestly discuss each and every issue at a Board meeting or annual meeting with documented minutes of what was said and done
 - Encourage disgruntled members or "troublemakers" to come to meetings to discuss the issues in a public forum
 - If you are concerned about violence, invite the neighborhood peace officer (regardless of jurisdiction)
 - Invite as many Board supporters (and non-partisan members) as possible to hear both sides
 - Publish the meeting agenda in advance
 - Do not ridicule or antagonize, but let the common goals and wishes of the membership shine through

- You want to show as many people as often as you can that their rights and property values are being protected
- During these times of controversy, keep looking for potential Board members
 - Vocal, yet rational members
 - Those who bring up "other" issues and desires
 - New blood to the neighborhood

Continuous Improvement

- The goal is to continually keep the Board and the Association moving forward
- For the Board and the Association to be successful and Active you must keep rejuvenating the Board with new faces
 - Not necessarily all at once
 - If the Association is small, try to rotate members on a regular basis
- Add new events and try different things to get members and residents to know each other
- Talk to other Associations and organizations about ways to keep improving and staying active
